### COVID-19 IN TRADITIONAL MARKETS EVIDENCE OF CONSUMER AND VENDOR RESILIENCE



COVID-19 has disrupted the lives and livelihoods of people worldwide — traditional markets are no exception. To examine the health, safety, and resilience of consumers and vendors in traditional markets in real time, <u>EatSafe conducted three research activities</u>:

Tracking vendor and consumer perceptions of COVID-19 impacts



Assessing resilience of vendors and consumers



Tracking the prices of a basket of select nutritious foods

from September 2020 to December 2021.







#### CONSUMERS

COVID-19 did not impact the variety of foods purchased by consumers in traditional markets.

Consumers' confidence in the safety of food purchased remained high throughout the pandemic.

Consumers' shopping frequency decreased over time.

#### VENDORS

Most vendors reported that COVID-19 reduced sales and consumer foot traffic.

COVID-19 surges prompted more vendors to consider leaving their business, though this diminished over time.

Vendors' financial dependency on borrowed money increased over time







#### IN BANGLADESH ...

EatSafe formed the Technical Working Group (TWG) with Bangladesh Food Safety Authority and Dhaka South City Corporation.

Using the data collected by EatSafe, the TWG identified priority recommendations for immediate action, including behavior change communications and infrastructure improvements.

The markets of focus have become ideal models in Dhaka city.



#### IN KENYA...

Like never before, transforming our food system for increased responsiveness to unpredictable shocks, like COVID-19, is a paramount priority.

## The wet market system is central to the overall food system.

The evidence provided by the market assessments during COVID-19 will continue to inform investments to transform food systems. Using a data-driven approach from these assessments, national and subnational governments made commitments in Kenya at the national COVID-19 Learning Conference.


